
MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT





EXHIBITIONS, UPDATE, AND POLICY


UPDATE on "Layering" at Dartmouth Street Gallery in June. Sixty-five artists entered the show. John Cacciatore chose one piece each from 25 artists to represent the concept of Layering. He feels this selection will look well and fit in his small, but well-respected, gallery. In doing this, he fulfilled exactly what SLMM asked him to do. We wanted to have a non-member professional choose a show from entries to suit his own space. This decision was made due to the growing size of our society. John was favorably impressed with the quality of the work. Had he more room, he would have chosen a larger number of pieces.

Venues large enough to hold one piece from each eligible member (over 125 full members now) will be increasingly hard to find. The only public space in Albuquerque is the State Fair Arts Gallery, which is in use by the Summer Festival of the Arts during the week of our meeting. We chose the week of June 21-27 to allow members to see the San Juan Pueblo dances on June 24th. Had we postponed the meeting in order to book the Fine Arts Gallery, we would have needed to pay attendants to sit the show and also for insurance and rent.

SLMM has held juried exhibitions with fees before, but everyone who entered was represented in our earlier shows, unless a technical problem prevented it. There are members in SLMM who do not approve of guaranteed acceptance. They think it can weaken an exhibit, and that all shows must be juried. Other members object to the jurying process.

Regional and local shows may have to replace the national scope of our exhibits. Ohio and New Mexico have had regional shows. New Mexico will have another State show in Los Alamos in 1994.
